The diagram below summarizes the main pathways through which urban local government can contribute to civic development.

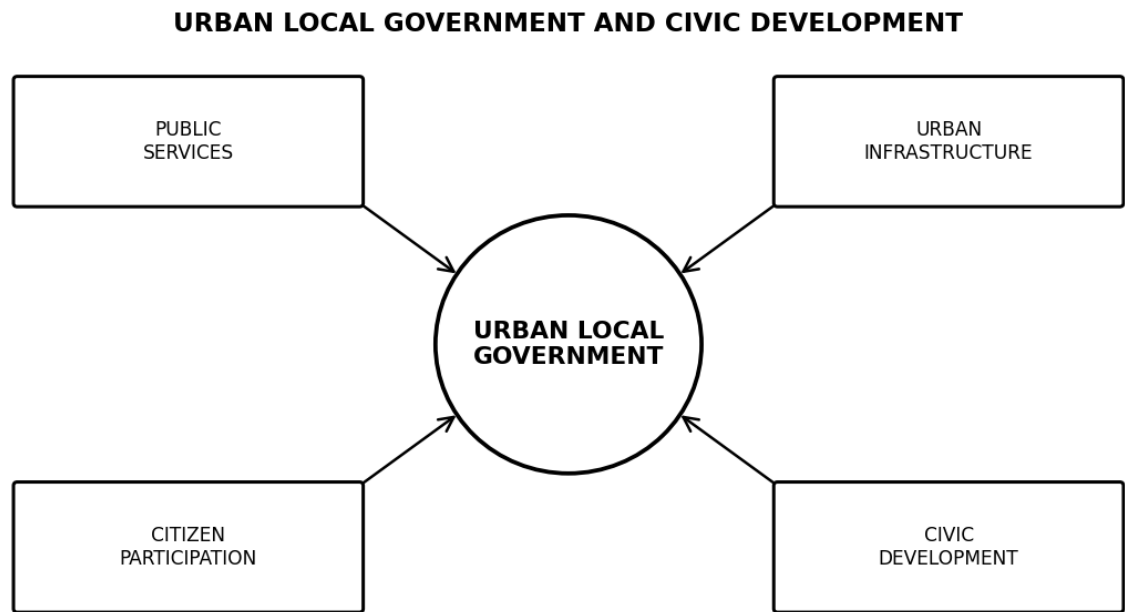


Figure 1. Simplified overview of urban local government and civic development.
